Minutes of the Meeting of the Swamp Fox Quilters Guild

President Frances Kelley called the meeting to order at 9:30 am. She welcomed members and guests Kristen Miller and Susan Bailey from the Nurse and Family Partnership, who will present a program later in the meeting. Frances also reminded Board members that a meeting will directly follow the meeting. **Treasurer's report:** Timi Bronson reported total income for the month was \$339.30 and expenses of \$937.82. Balance is currently \$4,790.29.

March 3, 2016

Membership: Rita Studdard reported 43 members present including one new member Karen Salomani.

Minutes from the previous meeting were approved as presented.

<u>Opportunity Quilt:</u> Rita Studdard reported that to date \$930.00 has been turned in from ticket sales. She reminded members that all tickets and money must been turned prior to lunch time Sunday March 13th at the remarkment.

Frances turned the meeting over to Kristen Miller who explained that the Nurse and Family Partnership is affiliated with McLeod Hospital and works with low income, first time mothers. They follow them from pregnancy through the first two years of the child's life teaching them how to take care of their baby and themselves. She said there is a need for baby quilts.

Reenactment: Tish VonHagel showed the project that will be offered during the weekend. She requested members lend her quilts to hang both days both inside the little building and outside. She will take quilts down at the end of each day and take them home for safe keeping. Please have your name on your quilt. Jan Davis has donated two period dresses for us the sell.

2016 Challenge: Joan Goodsell passed out entry forms for the upcoming challenge. Forms needed to be turned in with entry quilt at the May meeting. The luncheon following the June meeting at the Hartsville Country Club will cost \$14.00. This can be paid Timi Bronson any time from now to the May meeting. Tip to Consider

Having trouble removing that piece of fabric from the middle or bottom of a tall stack? Put that 11 or 12-inch square ruler to another use: Slide it under that fabric, lift the other fabrics on top of that one with your hand and pull out the target fabric. This technique prevents any bunching up and wrinkling of the remaining ones.

Directions to the Columns

From Florence, on Highway 76 toward Francis Marion, turn left at the Flea Market. Go about 2 miles, turn right on the Old Marion Highway. The Columns is on the left about 2 miles down. (5001 Rankin Plantation Road for GPS)

The 2016 Challenge



- a picture to guide our imaginations
- \bullet 2-3 layers of cardboard taped together, bigger than the background fabric
- fabric to glue the background to, larger than the scene (thin, cheap fabric)
- landscape material to make the scene, ex. Trees, birds, flowers

- 2 or more glue sticks
- scissors for cutting small items
- pins
- optional: easel, clamps to hold fabric to cardboard

April 21:



"Sewing is such a wonderful skill to learn. Not only is it handy when you need to adjust a hem or alter a pair of pants but it can lead to so much more as I discovered in 1984 when I made my first quilt.

Not only do I enjoy every step involved in making a quilt, landscape, wall hanging, basket or even a golf bag but also the joy that it brings to my family and friends that I make them for. I have especially grown fond of being asked to patch or repair a quilt because it lets me know that my gift is being loved, cherished and used, loved to pieces! Each and every day, I work on my craft and learn new and different ways to express myself through Fabric Art. All it takes is a pretty picture and some nice fabric to inspire me on my newest and next creation."



Timi Bronson (Member 2013)

Timi is a past member of the CT Modern Quilt Guild and the Clamshell Quilt Guild, and a current member of Coastal Carolina, Charlotte Quilters, and Modern Quilt Guild. "I started quilting in 1994 after a trip to Paducah with my Mom and sisters. I still had no interest in quilting until I saw the Art quilts displayed there. I have made a total of 3 bed quilts since then, have 1 that's been a UFO since 1994, all the rest of my quilts have been Art quilts.

My most recent favorite is WolfMoon made for the Fly Me to the Moon exhibit—the image that was in my head made it to fabric almost exactly. The there's Fall Oak—love the colors and techniques in this one—and Ode to Dreads, because it has to do with our daughter cutting off her nasty dreadlocks.

Originally I am from Pittsburgh, but have lived in New York, Mississippi, Calif., and Connecticut. Moved to Hartsville in 2013. I am a retired bookkeeper and have 1 daughter and 1 grandson. I won a fishing competition at age 5 in MN—caught a 7 lb. large mouth bass—beat adult males—thus began my love of fresh water fishing. I paint—watercolor, oil, mixed media. My favorite vacation was to Montana."



Jonnie Britton (Member 2014)

"I still consider myself a beginner. None of my relatives quilted though my mother, grandmother and aunt all made beautiful clothes. I learned to sew doll clothes on my grandmother's sewing machine when I was very young. I recall that when I learned to finish edges on my doll's creations using a zigzag stitch, I thought that was the best thing! I took Home Ec in junior high school and began my 'real' sewing when Daddy gave me a Singer Touch and Sew machine. I made many of my school clothes. Fast forward about 40 years and I began watching YouTube tutorials by Jenny Doan of Missouri Star Quilt Company. That sweet lady made me believe I could quilt! I had admired quilts but knew that accurately cutting squares with scissors would not work for me. But Jenny had a rotary cutter! So I dusted off my old Singer Touch and Sew and dug out a bunch of scraps and began cutting strips to make string blocks on newspaper squares. Since seams don't have to be accurate and 'anything goes' I was hooked. Our young grandson even helped make those string blocks with me. I have been hopelessly hooked every since!

I still have lots to learn! I have not done hand quilting or any real applique, but I will eventually get there...I hope! For now, I am having a ball learning all kinds of patterns. I think the vintage blocks are so interesting and want to do every one I see.

All the quilts I've made are my favorite! But the one that I described above made by my grandson and me certainly has to be one of the most special because we made it together. It's a string block all in blues and was the first quilt I free motion quilted on my machine...what a time I had with that! For that reason, I named it Blue Challenge.

I am South Carolina born and bred! God put me in the South for a reason. I love our beautiful state and would not want to live anywhere else. Our son and daughter live near, as do our granddaughters and grandson. Since hubby retired we have spent more time traveling. We enjoy day trips to state parks and interesting places all over SC, vacations to Disney World and last year took a Dream Trip driving cross country with no agenda or reservations. And we even stopped in Hamilton, MO, and I got to meet Jenny Doan and give her a big hug!

I am continuously researching our genealogy and have written two books on our family history. I love to travel to old family homesites and churches, walk the cemeteries where relatives are laid to rest. Photography is another passion that combines well with our travels and genealogy. Scrapbooking, card making, and crafts of all kinds fill my time when I'm not researching family or quilting."
