

Minutes from the April7, 2016, Meeting

President Frances Kelley called the meeting to order at 9:35 am.

Membership: Rita Studdard reported 39 members and 3 guests present.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Timi Bronson reported income for the month \$454.27, expenses \$431.84 and current balance of \$5,246.81. She also read a thank you letter for the donation made in Martha Herbert's name.

Minutes from the previous meeting were approved as presented.

2016 Opportunity Quilt: Rita Studdard gave a final report. Total amount from ticket sales was \$1,427.00, costs \$314.00, profit \$1,113.00. Rita Nuckles sold the most tickets and the winning ticket was sold by Karen Kirkland.

2017 Opportunity Quilt: Frances announced that the quilt on display was made by Ray Vance and quilted by Timi Bronson and is the Opportunity quilt for 2017. Tickets will be available soon. Frances reported the recommendation of the Board of Directors was to make tummy quilts for the Nurse Family Partnership. A motion was made and seconded. The motion passed. Frances showed some sample of the approximate size of 42x42 inches. Timi said she has a bolt of white flannel she will donate and will quilt tops for any members that wish.

Block of the Month: Tulips for May

"April Showers Bring May Flowers - May's BOM is an appliquéd tulip block, on a white muslin background. Members were provided an 18" bleached, white muslin square to use with their own choices for tulip blossoms, with green stems and leaves. Block to be trimmed (by the block winner) to 16-1/2" unfinished block (16" finished). Any member who did not receive the muslin square and instructions and pattern call Lorene Arnette. She will mail these items to you. Don't forget, the BOM for June is "Quilters Choice." Make your favorite block, using any colors, but you must use SOME blue.

(Note from Lorene) Ladies and gentleman -

I made a <u>HUGE</u> mistake on the instruction sheet for the May BOM - I took the instructions and templates from a Sampler Magazine and found, when I made my sample block that it was way, way too crowded for 12-inches. I did change the dimensions in the body of the instruction sheet, but overlooked the top line which says finish at 12-inches. <u>THAT IS WRONG!</u> I also noticed another mistake, which says the background square is 1" which is an obvious error; not so obvious is the 12-inch dimension on the top line. I am SO sorry about these errors; Again I apologize for the inconvenience for you.

Tip to Consider

Having a hard time removing that one piece of fabric in the middle of a stack of fabrics without destroying the stack? Some use a magazine placed under the targeted fabric, but a neater way is to use that large square plexiglass ruler that you have. It won't bend or get stuck in the middle of the stack. Even better is to put one ruler above the fabric, one below, and pull out the fabric. Then slide out the rulers. The stack stays neatly folded and you haven't pulled out your hair or said some choice words.

Re-enactment Recap: Battles, mini sewing projects, quilt displays, and a WEDDING!

Portable Pressing Table: Just in time for the May class

This month's project is a step saver when piecing at your machine. All it takes are a wooden TV tray (relatively inexpensive, found at Walmart), Insul-Brite or several layers of batting, fabric (either muslin or the heavier décor fabric), and a heavy duty stapler. Once you have it in your sewing room, you'll find more than one use for it—laying out blocks for piecing, pressing those seams, holding your notions and supplies within arm's length. Once you have finished with it, simply fold it up and stash it until the next sewing session. It will become one of your favorite supplies to carry to classes and retreats. The addresses for two tutorials are listed below along with some photos from the sites. If you do not have access to the internet, the instructions are simple: Cut out the batting and fabric, tuck under the table, and staple securely.
